From the Pastor

Take every opportunity to open your life and home to others. (Romans 12:13)

I've heard it said that sociologically speaking, American lives changed significantly when cars became widely available. Specifically, the culture of neighborhoods changed when we started building homes with garages and carports. With the widespread use of air conditioners in the South, large front porches went away and backyard decks took their place. People could conceivably never have to make contact with their neighbors-just park the car in the garage and stay inside until it's time to leave again the next day.

But the hunger to connect with others and for a place to belong has not gone away. A few years ago Kristin Schell was a busy mom who had just moved into a new neighborhood in Austin, Texas. She found herself desperate to slow down and connect. She had the hunger and initially thought she might need to plan events to meet neighbors and create community. Almost by accident, she found her answer. Schell put a turquoise (because it's her favorite color) picnic table in her front yard.

Schell realized that you can't be what you can't see. She felt called to love her neighbors, but couldn't figure out how to love them because she couldn't see her neighbors. When she put that picnic table in her front yard and spent some time out there she could see her neighbors. She talked to folks walking their dogs or going for a jog. She got to know her neighbors. Strangers became friends as they sat in the shade together. Community was formed that extended far beyond that picnic table.

Before long this became a movement. Turquoise tables are popping up all over the country, on busy city streets, in well-manicured suburban subdivisions, on dusty small town roads, and in church yards. The table is an invitation to slow down and connect.

Soon we'll have our own turquoise table on the lawn of the church, out front near our sign by the rec center. I plan to go out there some days to read and write. Stop by if you want. We don't really know what will happen with this. We're not going to schedule volunteers to staff it, or create elaborate programs to make sure it gets used. We're just going to invite people to slow down and connect. People might sit there while they wait for their class at the rec center. Parents of preschoolers might stop and talk at the table after morning drop off. Perhaps folks will find their way from the table to our little free library, our labyrinth, or even in to worship. At our last session retreat we talked about our desire to connect with the community, to invite people in, and to extend hospitality. This is a pretty easy way to do some of that.

Our plan is for the youth to prime and paint the table early this month, and to install it at their meeting on October 15th.

Schell was guided by scripture throughout the process of finding community and connection in her own front yard. As a member of a Presbyterian church in Austin she believed that she had a call, but wasn't sure what it was. Romans 12:13 says, "Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers." That particular verse kept playing in her head. She prefers a more modern translation: "Take every opportunity to open your life and home to others." Hospitality can be hard, but it doesn't have to be. It can be as easy as slowing down, sitting down, and connecting with others.

In her book, *The Turquoise Table*, Schell reflects, "We were created to be in community by a God who loves us extravagantly. God loves all of us, each and every one. In order for us to even get a glimpse of what that kind of majestic love looks like, we have to experience it through connection with others. So God gave us one another."

From the Treasurer

In September, our income was \$32,225.85, and our expenses totaled \$33,082.05. The year-to-date figures are \$310,288.57 income and \$309,335.49 expenses. Thus, we have a year-to-date surplus of \$953.08, which is good for this time of the year (i.e., end of summer).

For comparison, a year ago at this time, we had a deficit of \$7,499.

Currently, we have a mortgage balance of \$433,213.01. We have \$117,325.87 in our mortgage fund, and a monthly payment of \$4111. Therefore, we have funds on hand to cover over 28 months of payments.

We will collect the Peace and Global Witness Offering on World Communion Sunday, October 1. Fifty percent of the collection goes to PCUSA to support worldwide peace efforts. Twenty-five percent funds efforts of the Atlanta Presbytery. St. Andrews Mission Ministry will designate the remaining twenty-five percent for a cause that promotes peace within our community.

This special offering allows PCUSA to promote peace in violent areas such as South Sudan. John Khamis, a peacebuilding specialist who is one of 220,000 South Sudanese living in a Uganda refugee camp, can thus continue his work to encourage cooperation among rival ethnic groups.

This offering also funds special projects across America, including a joint effort by a San Francisco church, the local presbytery, and PCUSA to put together \$20,000 in seed money to help impoverished, war-battered refugee families find safety and experience the power of Christ's love in the world.

Locally, St. Andrews donated its portion of the 2016 collection to New American Pathways, a Christian non-profit that helps approximately 5000 refugees per year rebuild their lives and achieve long-term success.

Many thanks to Paul Burns and his team, for making the playground a much safer place for the children of SAS. We appreciate you and all that you do.


