Good Friday This Tenebrae worship service is based on ancient church traditions. Tenebrae is a Latin word that means "darkness" or "shadows." The service comes from the monastic tradition where Tenebrae was the last service on the eves of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, along with other daily worship. A significant feature of a Tenebrae service is the gradual extinguishing of the lights and candles in the room during the retelling of Jesus' last days. Join us in the Sanctuary or on YouTube Live at 7:30 PM.

Notes on Today's Music

Passion Sunday (also known in some traditions as Palm Sunday) is the day of Hosanna. The word has progressed from the Hebrew hosha na ("save us") to Greek to Late Latin to the Middle English osanna. Rarely used at other times in the Christian year, Hosanna is most closely linked with the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and, therefore, Passion Sunday.

The **Opening Voluntary** was composed by Noel Rawsthorne (1929 - 2019), a British liturgical and concert organist and composer of music for his own instrument, as well as choral music. He became Organist of Liverpool Cathedral in 1955, and served in this capacity until 1980. While there, he composed many original choral works, such as the "Festive Eucharist" (1978) which is still sung regularly by churches across the Anglican Diocese of Liverpool.

The text of the processional hymn, "All Glory, Laud, and Honor", dates from about 820 and was written by Theodulph, the Bishop of Orleans in France under the emperor Charlemagne. The music was composed by Melchior Teschner, who was born at the end of the sixteenth century. He was a pastor in the Lutheran Church and precentor at Fraustadt, Silesia (in what is now modern Germany). Teschner was a musician of considerable ability and was greatly interested in enriching public worship. The tune first appeared in a small tract published in 1615, quickly became popular, and is found in many choral books and hymnals dating from the late 1600's.

The **Musical Offering**, based on the text of Psalm 24:7-10, was composed by William Mathias (1934 - 1992), a Welsh composer noted for choral works. A child prodigy, he started playing the piano at the age of three and began composing at the age of five. He was professor of music and head of department in the University of Wales, Bangor, from 1970 until 1988. His compositions include large scale works, including an opera, three symphonies and three piano concertos. Much of his music was written for the Anglican choral tradition, most famously the anthem "Let the people praise Thee, O God" written for the July 1981 royal wedding of the Prince and Princess of Wales.

The **Offertory**, "Wondrous Love" (often referred to as "What Wondrous Love is This!"), is a Christian folk hymn from the American South. Its text was first published in 1811, during the Second Great Awakening, and its melody derived from a popular English ballad. Today it is a widely known hymn included in hymnals of many Christian denominations. This setting was composed by David N. Johnson (1922 - 1987), an American organist, composer, educator, choral clinician, and lecturer. Johnson published well over 300 compositions, most of them for church use.

"O Haupt voll Blut und Wunden" (paraphrased "O Sacred Head Sore Wounded) is based on a Latin text written during the Middle Ages. The poem was translated into German by the Paul Gerhardt (1607 - 1676), a German theologian, Lutheran minister and hymnodist.. The melody was composed by Hans Leo Hassler (1564 –1612) a German composer and organist of the late Renaissance and early Baroque eras.

This setting of the chorale is by Johann Kuhnau (1660-1722), a German composer, author, lawyer, and accomplished musician. His primary corpus is his myriad compositions for keyboard. He is considered the greatest figure among German composers for organ and harpsichord before J.S. Bach.
