Ministry Spotlight: OACM Trip by Pat Baker

"What do you need?" and "What'll ya have?"

Nineteen members and friends of St. Andrews visited the Center for Inclusive Design & Innovation (CIDI) and Georgia's Assistive Technology Act(AT) Program- Tools for Life, on Georgia Tech Campus, February



22nd. After visiting the center, we headed over to a downtown Atlanta institution: The Varsity, for lunch.

At the CIDI we learned all about the beginnings of the center and the history of the Assistive Technology Act from 1988 to present day. Tools for Life is Georgia's AT Act Program. The mission of this program is to provide Georgians of all ages and disabilities the opportunity to gain access to and acquisition of assistive technology devices and service so they can live, learn, work, and play independently in the communities of their choice. After learning all about the background we headed into the Tools for Life visitors center and were able to try out the tools that make all aspects of life easier. Those tools included ones for hearing, vision, safety, food prep, feeding, gaming, communication, aging & dementia and even a robot or two. I think that if you talked to folks who attended they will tell you about their favorite tool, personally for me it was the robotic cat.

We entered The Varsity to the words "What'll ya have?" and I noticed that most of us had hotdogs, onion rings and an orange drink or frosted orange. It was all so greasy and quite an indulgence which I loved! I could hear conversation all around the room of the wonderful memories of visiting the varsity as children or adults before or after a GA Tech football game.

If you were unable to go with us, you'll have an opportunity to visit the CIDI on your own on April 17, 2024 as they recognize National Assistive Technology Awareness Day. They are hosting a "Come and Play with Us" event during lunch from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.







From the Pastor - Holy Week

As we continue through the season of Lent, I hope you will join us for our special worship services during Holy Week. The week begins with Palm and Passion Sunday on March 24th. In worship, we'll wave palms and shout "Hosanna!" as we remember Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. We will celebrate the sacraments of baptism and communion and then turn toward the passion of Good Friday.

Maundy Thursday

Thursday, March 28th at 6:30 p.m., Heffner Hall

We will gather around tables to worship, share a meal, and remember the acts of Jesus during Holy Week. Our worship will include prayer, scripture, songs, a simple dinner, and the celebration of the Lord's Supper woven together. We call this day "Maundy Thursday," from the Latin word mandatum, which means "mandate" or "command." We remember that is the day when Jesus gave his disciples a new commandment to love one another. All ages are welcome.

Good Friday

March 29th at 7:30 p.m., Sanctuary

As a nod to the traditional "Stations of the Cross," this service invites you to walk "the way of sorrows" to the cross through the eyes and experiences of one of Jesus' closest disciples, Peter. This service will continue highlighting Peter's role in the crucifixion narrative as we follow Jesus to his death with Peter as our companion. By focusing on Peter, we are invited to imagine how we might have acted and behaved had we been there as one of Jesus' followers and friends. Following the narratives from John 13-19, we will engage, confess, and lament through prayer, scripture, reflection, silence, and song.

When the service is over, it will still be incomplete until Easter. You will be invited to continue the journey through Holy Week as you depart. You will be given prayers and suggested scripture readings to guide your devotions between Good Friday and Easter. Then, you are invited to return on Easter morning to celebrate the glorious resurrection.

You are invited to gather in the courtyard early in the morning for an outdoor Easter worship service. In the event of rain, we will gather under the shelter of the covered breezeway.

9:00 am Easter Fellowship & Egg Hunt, Courtyard

Easter Breads is a St. Andrews tradition sharing fellowship, coffee, and pastries on Easter morning. We will also have crafts and activities for the children, including an egg hunt. Please plan to join us, and if you are able, bring your favorite pastry or bread to share.

Flowering of the Cross, Courtyard

We invite you to bring flowers from home or your yard, make a flower, or use the flowers available at the church to adorn the cross in the courtyard. This sixth-century tradition of flowering the cross is an especially striking and beautiful way to symbolize the new life that emerges from Christ's death on Good Friday.

10:00 am Worship

We'll celebrate the resurrection and sing "Alleluia" in worship together, meeting in the Sanctuary and on YouTube Live.

Columbia Professor Presents History of Presbyterianism at St. Andrews

Associate Professor of Religious and Cultural History, Rev. Dr. William Yoo of Columbia Theological Seminary will present his recent work, What Kind of Christianity at St. Andrews on May 5th. Yoo's study assesses the Presbyterian church's complicity in slavery and anti-black racism over the 19th and 20th centuries. You can hear some of the book's themes in Yoo's plenary address at the recent Matthew 25 summit here. [Yoo's presentation starts at 1:15:30] We'll be reading "What Kind of Christianity" together through the month of April, with Sunday afternoon book discussions at 4:00 pm on April 14, 21, and 28. In January, our income was \$25,668.50, and our expenses totaled \$29,899.26. So, we are in the red by \$4,230.76. It is not unusual for us to be in the red in January.

Currently we have a mortgage balance of \$55,981.90. We have \$20,148.98 in our mortgage fund, and a monthly payment of \$4,111. Thus, we have funds on hand to cover 5 months of payments.
