From the Pastor:

Kate Bowler is an associate professor of the history of Christianity at Duke Divinity School. She wrote the first and only history of the American prosperity gospel—the belief that God wants to give you health, wealth, and happiness—before being diagnosed with stage IV cancer at age 35. While in treatment for that cancer that she was not expected to survive, she wrote two *New York Times* bestselling

memoirs, Everything Happens for a Reason (and Other Lies I've Loved) and No Cure for Being Human (and Other Truths I Need to Hear). There's something about that combination of scholarship, faith, real-world experience, humor, suffering, joy, and snark that I find so appealing and engaging. It also makes her prayers and blessings quite powerful and touching.

And so, not surprisingly, as I've been thinking about endings and beginnings, I thumbed through a few of her books, looking for words I couldn't find on my own. I shared the blessing I found with the session at our meeting on May 19th. We were all still so full, in our bellies and our hearts, from Pentecost Brunch Church. It was a worship service marking beginnings and endings. Pentecost is the birth of the church. In our Vital Congregations Initiative work, we have thanked God for what has been and sought guidance for what will be. As we burned the mortgage, we celebrated the end of mortgage payments and the faithful vision and work of the saints of St. Andrews in the past. But it also leaves us asking what is next now that we don't have the burden of debt—lots of endings and beginnings.

Because we are Easter people, we need not be afraid of death. And I know that may sound dangerously close to one of those "lies I've loved" that Bowler writes about, but it's true. One of the truths we need to hear amid endings and beginnings is that while we may not know what the future holds, we do know who holds the future. So, I end this with "A Blessing for Hellos and Goodbyes" from *Good Enough: 40ish Devotionals for a Life of Imperfection* by Kate Bowler and Jessica Richie.

Blessed are you on the brink of something new. A new life. A new career. A new commitment. A new relationship. A new decade. Blessed are you, dear one, so full of hope, you whose horizon extends far beyond what your eyes can see. May your celebration be sweet and delicious and perhaps contain some singing. This new thing is worth rejoicing. May the joy that buoys you today carry you through the difficult spots to come.

And blessed are you, closing the door on something you once loved. A home. A dream. A business. A marriage. You who fought and pleaded, tried and prayed. When the weight of the world rests on your shoulders and you feel as though you may drown under paperwork. You who sit in grief and despair, and maybe a little fearful for what happens... now.

May you, dear one, find comfort from places and people you don't anticipate who remind you that you are not alone. You may be saying goodbye to something—someone dear ... but something new will be born. I cannot promise it will replace what was there, and I won't try to tell you it will always be better. But, I do believe that we can find beauty, meaning, and truth right where we stand.


In our transitions. In our hellos and our goodbyes. And yes, even on the other side.


Brunch at Atria Park

A True Pentecost Celebration - Brunch Church by LaVerne Byas-Smith

On May 19th in Heffner Hall, we did a very biblical thing.... we had worship and fellowship over a meal at "Brunch Church," our Pentecost Sunday celebration. It was a glorious, Spirit-filled time.

Over seventy of us attended, feasting and fellowshipping at scattered tables designed to seat 10, but cozying up to accommodate the welcomed overflow. Starting early, at 9:45, after preparing our plates from the Brunch Potluck Buffet, we visited across tables whose red, mesh, "flames-of-fire" centerpieces symbolized the Holy Spirit uniting us all. Also in the center of each table were Vision Boards – collages prepared by our session and church staff to visually represent their hopes and dreams of the future St. Andrews - and a teardrop symbol of one of the marks of a vital congregation (VCI) which the table members would discuss later in the service. We reveled as we dined with one another, and with old familiar faces of long-time members [the Russ's came, as did the Todd's, down from the mountains]; but also, with newer members and regular attendees, like Bernadette and

Pat, Cameron and Nik. At 10:00 we moved into the worship service proper, yet still encouraged to continue feasting – on casseroles, donuts, brownies, bagels & cream cheese, bacon and fruit, and much more.

The worship service was as rich and full as the meal. Transported into sacred space by the Opening Voluntary, a beautiful bell choir selection, "Antiphonal Celebration," we then sang several favorite hymns, including "Let Us Build a House," and "The Church's One Foundation," beautifully accompanied (even on the Heffner piano) by Ed Weaver. The choir sang John Carter's "Come Holy Spirit, Like the Wind," and our Lay Reader, Carol Gordon read the full Acts 2 account of the Spirit's coming.

One unique aspect of this service involved the whole congregation's participation in declaring the Word. Everyone recited a Litany of Vitality, and the elders and Camille read scriptures and descriptions of the 7 Marks of Vital Congregations, which reminded us of the characteristics of a church full of the spirit of Christ and fully engaged in Jesus' ministry to the world. Then as witness to the measure of vitality at St. Andrews, each table, led by an elder, discussed for 15 minutes the results of our VCI Congregational Survey (administered back in December) This period of reflection and group discussion added to our fellowship and worship a Spirit-filled reminder of our unique calling to be Christ's hands and feet and body in the world.

After the Offering and its Dedication, we turned to a special time of celebration and thanksgiving -- Burning the Mortgage. Reciting a special litany and lighting afire a symbolic paper mortgage, we offered our humble thanks for God's faithful provision to this church through people and resources. As the flames consumed the mock mortgage we celebrated – some actually cheered. We sang in closing "We are One in the Spirit," a fitting ending to a day marked by flames, real and symbolic; feasting, a biblical ritual of thanksgiving for God's faithful provision; fellowship, mutual sharing of food and conversation; and worship, done in Spirit, united by the Holy Spirit.

We all left Brunch Church full and wanting, as with all mountain-top experiences, to do it again. Yet, we've been reminded of the purpose of our filling -- to go out into the world and shed abroad the love of Christ, confident that the Holy Spirit given to us at Pentecost will always be in us with us wherever we go.
