Maybe it's the political conventions, election countdown, hurricanes, and unrelenting heat. Perhaps it's the power grab and reckless destruction by Russia and the fighting back by Ukraine. Or Israel and the people of Gaza,




where a cease-fire seems less and less likely by the day. Maybe it's the fight for civil, gender, and fundamental human rights that some of us mistakenly believed had been settled long ago. It could be all the broken hips, ankles, air-conditioners, and roofs. Or maybe it's just me and my corner of the world, with my messy family and life with two teenagers, but I see so much disorder in the world—the kind we need to rise up against.

So often, we're too tired or don't know where to start, but Reformed theologian Karl Barth reminds us that we already have a powerful tool at our disposal. Barth said, "To clasp the hands in prayer is the beginning of an uprising against the disorder of the world." Prayer, in that sense, is revolutionary. Prayer is often what we do when we don't know what else to do. I know I've said it before, but I don't think our prayers work by changing God's mind or calling God's attention to something when God is otherwise distracted by many things. I believe prayer has more to do with what it does to the ones praying.

Sometimes, we ask for prayers for a particular situation or tell someone who has just shared difficult news that we'll be praying for them. That may feel like a cop-out, but there is something quite powerful about sharing the load. Having more people praying for your concern doesn't increase your odds of getting the outcome you want, but it does increase the number of people who can support you, so you don't feel quite so alone. Praying for someone may not feel all that helpful to them, but the gift of the Christian community is that when you might not have the words or the energy to pray yourself, others can step in and speak the prayers for you. *The Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words* (Romans 8:26).

A few weeks ago, when we had the Blessing of the Backpacks at the Tucker Farmers Market, we brought out the prayer trellises we first used in October of 2020 for our drive-through "Pets, Prayers, and Pledges"

event. We placed the trellises again, this time in the grassy area between the ramp to Heffner Hall and the driveway to the West parking lot. We invited the folks at the farmers market to add their prayers by writing on a tag and attaching it to a trellis. We'll leave the trellises up at least through the market season. We'll collect the tags and pray for each during our weekly Church at Prayer group.



You are invited to stop by and add your prayers, too. And if you want, stop and read some of the prayers tied on and add those to your own prayers. The disorder of the world may feel overwhelming. The uncertainty in your own life might make you feel like you don't even have the words to begin to pray. But God gives us the gifts of community and the Holy Spirit. As we affirm in *A Brief Statement of Faith*, "In a broken and fearful world, the Spirit gives us courage to pray without ceasing." And that same Spirit, "intercedes with sighs too deep for words."

Next month, you will be invited to pray for a word of discernment about this congregation based on what we've learned by listening to our neighbors this summer. We will spend a season in prayer, seeking a word from God about how St. Andrews is called to be vital in this time. You can look forward to hearing more about that next month.

As leaders, we are tasked with many things from maintenance to ministry to money management. Church leaders are to be good shepherds: as servant leaders we should never walk by "a problem". That is not to say that we should view the world as an endless series of challenges, but rather we should be vigilant in our journey when seeking the light in the world.

As many of you may have noticed, it has been a busy year for the Management Ministry. The mortgage debt was retired. After a series of upgrades, we are back in compliance with the Fire Inspector. A Financial Review Committee was convened, led by Edward Forrester, and the Session received their report on July 14th. Air conditioning units for the Education Building and Music Room and Youth Lounge were

repaired. The Worship computer was added to the church network and additional audio-visual work to get the screens and monitors fully functional was completed at the end of August.

Working with Management member-at-large, Fernando Chen, the Education and Administrative Building roofs were replaced, and the Sanctuary roof was also repaired. These repairs were covered by our insurance company, Brotherhood Mutual. Little did we know we would need to re-engage Brotherhood and West Roofing when a tree fell onto the Education Building in June. Those repairs are now complete.

To keep our campus safe, we proactively had all trees on our campus inspected after the fall. During the week of July 26th the trees that were identified as potentially dangerous behind the Education Building were cut down. A cluster of them were in the location where the original tree had fallen. We will be collaborating with the Caring for Creation team to identify opportunities to plant new trees in other locations on the property.

There is so much more we want to accomplish this year: upgrading the failing phone system, modernizing the church website for mobile phones and increasing search engine optimization so the church and school are more easily found online, and working on building and grounds improvements. To cut expenses we would prefer to perform proactive preventative, rather than deferred maintenance, work. Ideally, we would be less dependent on a few volunteers to perform grounds maintenance and lawn mowing; however, volunteers do reduce expenses. If you are able, please consider volunteering to help with our significant maintenance and ground needs. Express your interest to any church leader or call the church office. We welcome any and all willing hands.

As you may have seen in this *Lamplighter*, we are approximately \$11,000 in the red for the year. We'd like to remind everyone to please check your financial statement to make sure you are current with your pledge and, if possible, contribute a little more to help close the gap. The generosity of this congregation has never failed, and we trust in you that we will end the year solvent.

St. Andrews - Embracing our Whole Campus in Community by LaVerne Byas-Smith

St. Andrews' campus buzzes lately with increased activity. From the recent annual Back-to-School Carnival to the weekly Tucker Farmers Market, Friday night AA meetings and Sunday afternoon worship services of Cristo Para Todas Las Naciones, people of sundry backgrounds are coming and going throughout the week. Our Older Adult and Caregivers ministry hosts a variety of workshops, including A Matter of Balance, and Auditory awareness, bringing church and community members together in these popular classes. And several outside organizations have utilized our space. It's a blessing to share with so many this wonderful space God has given us stewardship.

But something new, something other than space-sharing has germinated, with two of our campus residents – the Farmers Market and St. Andrews School. And it's a good thing. St. Andrews increasingly embraces the whole of our campus as Our Community. This is more than just proximity. The Tucker Recreation Center, for example, is close by, as is the Mangrum law firm. But most SAPC members rarely see, let alone interact with their workers. While both are our neighbors, who would call either part of the St. Andrews community?

It's different with Tucker Farmers Market (TFM); and even more so with St. Andrews School (SAS). As they operate on our campus and in our

buildings, we increasingly find ourselves extending *our presence* into *their* spaces. While there we've found welcome, and *our purposes* have flourished in their context. SAPC's relationship with these two entities differs greatly. Technically our relationship with TFM is just a land use agreement. SAS on the other hand is a ministry of the church.

With such disparate affiliations one would expect divergent interactions with TFM and SAS. However, our past interactions with both were similarly distant; our activities rarely intersected. They both operated with minimal interaction with the church, except members shopping at the Market, and the school transferring payments to the church. Recently for both this has begun to change. We discern God moving on our campus -- and in us -- to draw us together with both the school and the Market in greater unity for God's purposes.

What does "greater unity" with the Farmers Market look like? It starts with seeing the market and its shoppers as people to reach and serve with the love of Christ. Pastor Camille led the way offering the Blessing of the Back Packs to families shopping at the market. She blessed backpacks and distributed Bag Tags to school kids who came backpacks-ready to receive. Last fall Camille also conferred Pet Blessings on St. Francis, Patron Saint of Animals, Day. At our Free Books Table market shoppers take as many free books as they like, also receiving information about SAPC and our activities. Table volunteers engage browsers, many obviously seeking community as well as books. Several "regulars" return weekly to the Book Table to browse, but also to talk. Listening is another way we love our neighbor. Our latest ministry effort at the Market, Intercessory prayer, uses the Prayer Trellis as a way for shoppers to submit prayer requests. Shoppers grab a tag off the trellis, write their request, and tie it back on, assured that our Church @ Prayer group will pray over their concern. We've publicized the Prayer Trellis on the Market's FB page.

Market management welcomes our incursions into their spaces, providing gratis our booth and during the Blessings AV equipment. They regularly publicize our appearances on their website and Facebook page. TFM extends our ministry beyond our sanctuary yet right on our campus, enabling us to reach in love and service neighbors who might never come to church.

Recent developments regarding St. Andrews School represent a turning point in our relationship with the school. Far too long the school community, while officially a ministry of SAPC, felt distant and unseen by the church. Far too often church members referred to SAS as "them," betraying a mindset of disunity, even alienation. While the school operates in our space, except for two church families whose children attend, we rarely engaged the school community. Despite a difficult history of missteps, Camille, Session, and other church and school leaders have turned the page in this relationship. The rewriting of the school constitution, and the reinstatement of a school board, anchor our efforts to further integrate SAS families and faculty into a more unified St. Andrews community. En-Core service activities -Storytime, Music Class, serving families at the school Thanksgiving meal and facilitating church love offerings – provide a balm of relational overtures. Management Ministries' recent physical improvements of the education wing - the new roof, most notably- and scheduled further improvements signal the church's renewed commitment to the school. The path has been laid. These demonstrations of our rededication give us greater credibility as we work to revitalize our connection with St. Andrews School and draw them closer in Community.

How else might we work towards unity with SAS? Perhaps most consequentially, by reestablishing a new school board where church members will serve alongside school parents for the betterment of

SAS. Pray now for SAPC members who will agree to serve. If you are asked, be willing, with God's grace, to fulfill this very important assignment.

The Fall BBQ, coming soon on September 29th, presents another more casual opportunity. We invite all SAS families to attend. Weather permitting, we'll provide courtyard seating and games leaders so school parents can enjoy their food and fellowship, while their children play in the courtyard. Every church member should make a point to welcome and engage our SAS guests and make them feel a part of the homecoming.

Our En-Core volunteers, with security clearance from the State of Georgia, enter SAS spaces each week at Storytime and Music Class. SAS teachers and children delight in the reading and singing activities. En-Core envisions lots of ways SAPC might serve the school community, limited only by the number of church members willing to volunteer. This Christmas En-Core invites SAS students and families to join SAPC in producing a Pageant for the Christmas Eve Family Service. We're teaching the children Christmas songs and inviting SAS parents to participate alongside SAPC members as readers. Welcoming SAS in Christmas Eve worship will foster greater community as we work together to glorify God.

God is doing a new thing on our campus at St Andrews. Can you perceive it? There's a long history here of serving our neighbors. But something more is happening. At the Tucker Farmers Market, where people from far and wide come here to us, and at St. Andrews School, where too often they've not felt a part of us, we're entering their spaces with our purpose to show God's love. Going outside our church walls into TFM and SAS, we're directing our love and service beyond our membership, and in so doing we're developing a more unified, expanded community right here on our whole St. Andrews campus.






