Notes on today's music:

Opening Voluntary This tune is among the more than 150 contemporary Christian tunes composed by Dick and Melodie Tunney - a husband-and-wife duo who have written for and performed with many contemporary Christian artists. They have written songs for Sandi Patti, Larnelle Harris and other Christian artists. Tedd Smith and Don Hustad were for decades the piano and organ duo for Billy Graham. This arrangement was composed in 1985.

First Hymn The words and music by Marty Haugen (b. 1950), were written as a gift for the St. Thomas Becket Catholic Community in Eagan, Minnesota for the dedication of a new church in1994. Although the imagery of construction is used throughout the text, the concern is not for a physical structure, but rather a spiritual one.

Joyful Response First published and recorded in 1983, this praise song was written and composed by the husband and wife team of Michael W. Smith (b. 1957) and Deborah D. Smith (b. 1958).

Second Hymn It seems appropriate to conclude the series on the statements of faith that have been the building blocks of our reformed tradition with this hymn, rich in Scripture references proclaiming Jesus Christ as the foundation of the church. There is no irony that this hymn has been sung at every major event in this history of Saint Andrews. The text was written by Samuel John Stone (1839-1900) and first published in 1866; the music composed by Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810-1876) in 1864. The text and music first appeared together in 1868.

Benediction in Music The text is based on a portion of the 8th century Latin hymn Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est, (Where are charity and love, God is there), translated and rhymed here by Omer Westendorf in 1960. In the 10th and 11th centuries it became attached to the ritual footwashing of Maundy Thursday, (from the Latin maundatum = commandment) the reference to Christ's "new commandment" to love one another (John 13:34).
