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Information on this Week's Music

Today is our Sunday of *Veni Emmanuel*, an ancient hymn that is both a plaintive prayer and an urgent cry. Could ever this hymn be more appropriate to our times as right now? The Latin prose that is believed to be pre-9th century. It consisted of seven antiphons sung as a response after a Psalm on the seven days before Christmas. Each antiphon was based a one (or more) or the messianic titles from Hebrew scripture and was a prayer addressed to Christ. Even in translation "Veni" in imperative form is "O come" in English - and the antiphons became to be known as the "Great Os". Also, originally the verses were arranged to form an acrostic yielding two Latin words: *ero cras* meaning "I will be tomorrow" - a direct reference to Hebrews 13:8 - that Christ is "the same yesterday and today and forever" The tune is traditional plainsong thought to have been from the 11th century; however, recent research has confirmed the tune to be from a 13th century French document. Whatever the original source, the tune and the words combined have become a signature expression of the emotions of Advent.

The **Opening Voluntary** is by Noël Goemanne (1926–2010), a Belgian-born musician, who in 1952 emigrated to the United States, where he became well known as an organist, as a choirmaster and as a composer, especially of, but not limited to, sacred music. An interesting note to his life: during World War II the Nazi occupier tried to persuade him to become a composer for the Third Reich, but he refused. He was later arrested for playing music by Felix Mendelssohn, a Jewish composer, in public.

The **first Hymn Introduction** is from a collection of pieces for Advent and Christmas by Paul Manz (1919-2009) who long served the church as recitalist, composer, teacher and leader in worship.

The **second Hymn Introduction** was composed by Roy Brunner (b. 1945), an American composer and organist who served at Park Street Church, Boston.

The **Benediction in Music** is by Noel Rawsthorne (b. 1949), an English organist and educator. He was organist of Liverpool Cathedral for 25 years and Senior Lecturer in Music at St. Katherine's College, Liverpool until his retirement in 1993.
