Notes on Today's Music

Opening Voluntary The text was written in 1676 by Samuel Rodigast (1649-1708), a German teacher and hymnwriter. It was written to comfort a sick friend. The text and music first appear in the *Weimar Gesangbuch*, 1681. In it he lays out what it means to deal with the problem of pain and suffering through the perspective of faith. Our God is sovereign and full of love, and every circumstance he brings us through is good and right and true.

This chorale setting is by Johann Gottfried Walther (1684–1748) who was a German music theorist, organist, composer, and lexicographer of the Baroque era. It has two contrasting verses: the first is an ornamented setting with the chorale in the upper voice; the second has the melody in canon between the soprano and bass, with the latter played in the pedal. Here is a translation of the text:

O God, what You ordain is good, Your holy will abiding; We shall be still, whate'er You do, and follow in Your guiding You are our God; Though dark our road, You hold us that we shall not fall; Wherefore to You we leave it all.

First Hymn The text was written by Isaac Watts (1674-1748), an English Congregational minister, hymn writer, theologian, and logician. He was a prolific and popular hymn writer and is credited with some 750 hymns. He is recognized as the "Godfather of English Hymnody"; many of his hymns remain in use today and have been translated into numerous languages. The text is a paraphrase of Psalm 90:1-5 and first appeared in *The Psalms of David Imitated in the Language of the New Testament* (London, 1719).

The music was composed by William Croft (1678-1727), an English composer and organist, and is remembered almost exclusively as a composer of church music. He was a chorister at the Chapel Royal under John Blow, who exerted a very strong influence over all composers of this period. At the age of twenty-two Croft became Organist of St. Anne's, Soho, hence the original name of the tune St. Anne's. It was shortened to St. Anne in an 1861 collection which became standard. In 1708 Croft succeeded his master, John Blow, as Organist of Westminster Abbey and Composer to the Chapel Royal.
