Notes on Today's Music

Opening Voluntary & First Hymn Be Thou My Vision *Rop tú mo baile, a Choimdiu cride* in Irish Gaelic - is preserved in two manuscripts (National Library of Ireland and the Royal Irish Academy) both dating from the 10th or 11th century. This prayer-hymn belongs to a special category know as a *lorica*, a Latin word meaning "armor" or "breastplate". Clearly referencing Ephesians 6:11-18, such prayers are understood to be an incantation of divine protection. The author is unknown and is likely the work of an anonymous Irish monk from around the 8th century. The rhymed version we use was translated by Eleanor Hull in 1912.

The music is a traditional Irish folk tune first combined with Hull's couplets in the Irish *Church Hymnal* (Dublin, 1919). The combination soon appeared in a number of British hymnals and first appeared in North America in a Canadian hymnal published in 1930.

The arrangement is by Dale Wood (1934-2003), an American composer, organist, and choral director best known for his church music compositions.

The text and music of the **Joyful Response** was written by Richard Colligan (b. 1967) while a student at Union Theological Seminary in Twin Cities in 2003 as part of his thesis. He wanted to create a song cycle built around the traditional order of worship. He became drawn the *lorica* hymns (see above) for the imagery and mysticism found in Celtic poetry and the allure of Celtic folk music.

The **Benediction in Music** was composed by John Alcock (1715-1806), an English organist and composer. He wrote instrumental music, glees and a significant volume of church music. Alcock grew up as a chorister at St. Paul's Cathedral and rose from being the organist of various parish churches to obtaining a Doctor of Music degree from Oxford in 1766. A voluntary is a piece of music, usually for an organ, that is played as part of a church service. In English-speaking countries, the music played before and after the service is often called a 'voluntary', whether or not it is titled so.
