Notes on Today's Music

The **Opening Voluntary** was composed by David N. Johnson (1922 - 1987), an American organist, composer, educator, choral clinician, and lecturer. Johnson published well over 300 compositions, most of them for church use, and was author of an *Instruction Book for Beginning Organists* (1964) and an *Organ Teacher's Guide* (1971). This piece was published in 1962.

First Hymn The text for "Immortal, Invisible. God Only Wise" was written by William Chalmers Smith (1824-1908) and published in his book *Hymns of Christ and the Christian Life* (London, 1867). He was a hymnist, author, poet, and minister of the Free Church of Scotland.

The Free Church of Scotland was a Scottish denomination which was formed in 1843 by a large withdrawal from the established Church of Scotland in a schism or division known as the Disruption of 1843. In 1900 the vast majority of the Free Church of Scotland joined with the United Presbyterian Church of Scotland

The music is a traditional Welsh folk melody which first appeared in Caniadau y Cyssegr (Songs of the Sanctuary) edited by John Roberts (Denbigh, Wales. 1839)

Attributed to William Williams (1717-1791), it would take a full page to list the publishing history and transformation of the original Welsh *Argiwydd, arwain trwy'r anialwch* into the form of the hymn we know today. The original poem began as five six-line stanzas. It was translated into English by Peter Williams (1722-1796) into three six-line stanzas To be certain, the hymn cites new fewer than 15 Scripture references in the three verses.

The tune CWM RHONDDA was composed by John Hughes (1873-1932) and first published in *Cân a Mawl: Song and Praise* (Chicago, IL 1918). The tune derives its name from Chapel Rhondda, a Welsh Baptist chapel, and was composed for the 1907 Cymanfa Ganuan, the chapel's annual singing festival.
