Notes on this Week's Music

Passion Sunday (also known in some traditions as Palm Sunday) is the day of *Hosanna*. The word has progressed from the Hebrew *hosha na* ("save us") to Greek to Late Latin to the Middle English *osanna*. Rarely used at other times in the Christian year, Hosanna is most closely linked with the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and, therefore, Passion Sunday.

The Opening Voluntary" Hosanna! Loud Hosanna" is based on the hymn tune ELLACOMBE. The text of this familiar Passion Sunday hymn was written by Jeanette Threlfall (1821-1880) and first published in her collection *Sunshine and Shadow: Peoms* (London, 1873). The composer of the tune is unknown but it first appears in a collection of hymns for the ducal court of Württemberg, Germany in 1784 and finally in England in *Hymns Ancient and Modern* in 1868. The latter is a hymnal in common use within the Church of England, a result of the efforts of the Oxford Movement. Over the years it has grown into a large family of hymnals.

This setting is by Joel Raney (b. 1956) who has over 200 titles in print including numerous choral anthems, musicals and cantatas, handbell compositions, piano solos, and instrumental works. For more than a decade, Joel was Artist-in-Residence at the First Presbyterian Church of River Forest, Il, and currently serves as Minister of Music at the First Baptist Church of Oak Park, Il.

The text of the hymn, "All Glory, Laud, and Honor+, dates from about 820 and was written by Theodulph, the Bishop of Orleans in France under the emperor Charlemagne. The music was composed by Melchior Teschner, who was born at the end of the sixteenth century. He was a pastor in the Lutheran Church and precentor at Fraustadt, Silesia (in what is now modern Germany). Teschner was a musician of considerable ability and was greatly interested in enriching public worship. The tune first appeared in a small tract published in 1615, quickly became popular, and is found in many choral books and hymnals dating from the late 1600's.

The text for "Ride On! Ride On in Majesty" was written by Henry Hart Milman (1791-1868) which first appeared in a collection of hymns for the church year in London, 1827. It portrays a sense of someone observing from aside rather than a participant in the event. The tune ST. DROSTANE was composed specifically for this text by Henry Bacchus Dykes (1823-1876), a vicar of the Church of England and a noted composer of hymn tunes including for "Holy! Holy! "(NICAEA), Etrenal Father, Strong to Save" (MELITA), and "Come, Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove" (ST. AGNES). Published in a major key, the organist has altered it to minor to reflect the spirit of the days that are approaching in Jesus' life and ministry.

The Benediction in Music "O Haupt voll Blut und Wunden" (O Sacred Head, Sore Wounded) is the ninth of the eleven chorale preludes for organ set by Johannes Brahms (1833-1897). Written in 1896 at the end of the composer's life and published posthumously in 1902 as Op. 122, they are his final Opus. They are based on verses of nine Lutheran chorales. The music, composed by Hans Leo Hassler (1564-1612) became known to us as the PASSION CHORALE because of its frequent use by Johann Sebastian Bach in his *St. Matthew Passion*. A final irony is that the eleventh chorale, almost certainly the last music from his pen, was "O Welt, ich muß dich lassen" (O World, I must leave you).
