Notes on Today's Music

ALLELUIA is associated with two of the great holy days of the church - Christmas and Easter. It is because of this close tie with Jesus's coming and His resurrection that it is the tradition in some churches to omit the use of the word Alleluia in both liturgy and song during the penitential seasons which precede these holidays. (Advent and Lent). With the joyous antiphon announcing the risen Savior which we will share together beginning this morning's worship, Alleluia returns to the Christian's language of celebration and praise.

The Opening Voluntary was composed by Kevin McChesney (b. 1963), a composer and arranger of handbell music. He currently has over 450 titles in print and is one of the very few musicians who makes handbells a full time vocation. In 1991, McChesney founded the Pikes Peak Ringers, a community handbell choir based in Colorado Springs, Colorado, which he directs. In addition to performances throughout the state of Colorado and the western United States, the Pikes Peak Ringers have been the featured group at several national handbell choir events, have been involved with publishers in providing promotional recordings of new releases, and have recorded five studio CDs and produced two performance DVDs.

"Jesus Christ Is Risen Today", indeed the consummate Easter Hymn, was originally a Latin hymn dating from the four-teenth century and whose author(s) is unknown. The fourth verse in our hymnal was written by Charles Wesley and published in 1740. The tune first appeared in the collection of hymns entitled Lyra Davidica. While this collection dates from 1708, the composer is unknown and the entire collection survives in a single engraved copy in the British Museum. It is ironic that neither author nor composer is known for one of the most beloved hymns in Christendom. This arrangement is by Cynthia Dobrinski (b. 1950), a composer and arranger of handbell music. She currently has more than 175 works in print. She also works as an instructor and has conducted about 350 handbell workshops and festivals internationally.

Both the text and the music for "Thine Is the Glory" have been through a series of change of first intent. The inspiration of the original French text (A toi la glorie, O Ressuscite) by Edmond Budry (1854-1932) behind the English version seems to have been a German text by Friedrich-Heinrich Ranke (1798-1876) which was intended to celebrate Christ's entry into Jerusalem, which through translation and paraphrase, creates a shift from acclamation (Christ's entry) to declaration (Christ's Resurrection). At least, the original text - and it's adaptations - were intended to be set to Handel's music.

The music by Handel (1685-1759) first appeared in his oratorio Joshua, An Oratorio (London, 1748) for chorus, but the music proved so popular that Handel inserted it into his earlier oratorio Judas Maccabeus ((1746) when he reworked the piece in 1751. It was first used as a hymn setting in Harmonia Sacra (London, 1753).
