Notes on Today's Music

The Opening Voluntary and The Benediction in Music are settings of verses of the Magnificat - My soul magnifies the Lord - from Luke 1:46-55, also referred to as The Canticle of Mary or Mary's Song of Praise.

Marcel Dupré (1886-1971) was a French organist, composer, and pedagogue. Born at Rouen into a musical family, Marcel Dupré was a child prodigy. His father Albert Dupré was organist in Rouen and a friend of Aristide Cavaillé-Coll, who built an organ in the family house when Marcel was 14 years old. He entered the Paris Conservatoire in 1904, where he studied with some of the most famous French organists and composers. In 1914, Dupré won the Grand Prix de Rome for his cantata, *Psyché*. Twelve years later, he was appointed professor of organ performance and improvisation at the Paris Conservatoire, a position he held until 1954.

Dupré became famous for performing more than 2,000 organ recitals throughout Australia, the United States, Canada and Europe, which included a recital series of 10 concerts of the complete works of Bach in 1920 (Paris Conservatoire) and 1921 (Palais du Trocadéro), both performed entirely from memory.

The well-known melody of "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee" was created by Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827) to provide a choral setting of J. C. F. von Schiller's poem "An die Freude" (To Joy) as the final movement of his *Ninth Symphony*. The text was authored specifically for this tune by Henry van Dyke (1852-1933), a prominent Presbyterian pastor, author, educator, and diplomat.
