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Notes on today's music

The **Opening Voluntary** is based on the text by Thomas Chisholm (1866-1960), a Methodist writer and pastor. Written as a meditation on Lamentations 2:22-23, it was first published in *Songs of Salvation and Service* and was combined with the music composed specifically for it by William Runyan (1870-1957), who was also a Methodist pastor. This setting was arranged for piano and organ by the team of Tedd Smith (b. 1927; London, Ontario, Canada) and Don Hustad (1918-2013). Smith, who trained at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, joined the Billy Graham Evangelical Crusades as pianist in 1950, retiring in 2004. Hustad was organist for the crusades from 1961 until 1967 at which time he joined the faculty at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary where he was a professor for 40 years.

First Hymn: The text for *Today We All Are Called to Be Disciples* was written by H. Kenn Carmichael (1908-1996), a retired Presbyterian minister, for a stewardship campaign. The text places stewardship in the context of faithful witness. The tune KINGSFOLD is an English melody arranged by Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) which he named for the Sussex village where he first heard it. The text and tune first appeared together in *The Presbyterian Hymnal* (Louisville, KY, 1990).

The text for the **Joyful Response** was composed in July, 1976 by Jane Parker Huber (1926-2008) on the occasion of the National Meeting of United Presbyterian Women when no singable hymn using inclusive language related to their theme of "Live into Hope" based on Luke 4.

The text for the **Offertory Response** is a paraphrase of Psalm 138 from *The New Metrical Version of the Psalms* (1909). The music is by Dimitri Bortniansky (1751-1825), a Russian and Ukrainian composer, harpsichordist and conductor, who served at the court of Catherine the Great.

Second Hymn: The words and music for "Lift Every Voice and Sing" were written and composed by brothers James and Rosamon Johnson in Jacksonville, Florida in 1899 to commemorate Lincoln's birthday. Originally written for school children, it premiered on February 12, 1900 sung by 500 children for Booker T. Washington. By 1919, it was destined to become known as the "African-American National Hymn."

The **Benediction in Music**, based on the well-known melody created to provide a choral setting of J. C. F. Schiller's poem, "An die Freude" (To Joy), as the final movement of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. The text we sing was written by Henry van Dyke (1852-1933), a prominent American Presbyterian pastor, author, educator, and diplomat. This setting was composed by Matthew Corl (b. 1965), a respected organist, recitalist, and composer, on the occasion of his son's wedding in 2002. The theme is set using an interesting variation between the musical meters of 6/8 and 3/4.
