Notes on Today's Music

The tune for the Opening Voluntary is attributed to William Moore (19th century). It first appeared in *The Columbian Harmony* (Cincinnati, 1825), a collection of shaped note Appalachian tunes, of which Moore was the editor. Like many folk tunes and spirituals, HOLY MANNA, is based on a five-note (pentatonic) scale and its AABA structure makes it easy to learn, sing, and remember. The name derives from the text of "Brethren, We Have Met to Worship" attributed to George Askins (d. 1816), a Methodist pastor who was an itinerant preacher for the Baltimore Conference.

The setting is by Dale Wood (1934-2003), an American composer, organist, and choral director best known for his church music compositions.

The text of "Blessed Assurance, Jesus Is Mine" was written by Fanny Jane Crosby (1820-1915), an American mission worker, poet, lyricist, and composer. She was a prolific hymnist, writing more than 8,000 hymns and gospel songs, with more than 100 million copies printed. She is also known for her teaching and her rescue mission work.

The music was composed by Phoebe Palmer Knapp (1839-1908), an American musician and the composer of 500 tunes, primarily music for hymns. She married a wealthy businessman and used her wealth and position to support the arts and budding artisans.

The music for the Offertory Response was composed by Hal Hopson (b. 1933), a full-time composer, church musician, conductor, and clinician. He has over 3000 published works, which comprise almost every musical form in church music. With a special interest in congregational song, he continues to make a significant contribution to the new repertoire of hymn tunes and responsorial psalm settings.

The author of the text for "Amazing Grace", John Newton (1725-1807), was a former captain of slave ships who later became an abolitionist and an English Anglican cleric. As was his custom, he would write hymns to accompany his sermons; in this instance 1 Chronicles 17:16-17. The composer of the tune is unknown, but it was harmonized by Edwin Excell and included in the collection he published, Columbian Harmony (Cincinnati, 1829)

The Benediction in Music is based on the tune DUNDEE from the Scottish Psalter, 1615, published in Edinburgh by Andro Hart. DUNDEE was one of that hymnal's twelve "common tunes"; that is, it was not associated with a specific psalm. In the Psalter Hymnal the tune is in isorhythmic form (all equal rhythms) and has a harmonization that was published in Thomas Ravenscroft's *Whole Booke of Psalmes* (1621). The tune's name comes from the city of Dundee, known as the "Scottish Geneva" during the era of the Scottish Reformation.

Roy Brunner (b. 1945), an American composer and organist who is currently organist of historic Park Street Church (Congregational) on the Boston Common. He recently retired as Professor of Music at Gordon College, Wenham, Massachusetts.
