Notes on Today's Music

The musical basis for the **Opening Voluntary** is the hymn tune MORECAMBE composed by Frederick Cook Atkinson (1841-1896) and first published in the *Congregational Church Hymnal* (London, 1887). He is said to have originally created this tune for "Abide with Me" for use in the parish where he was then organist in a town in northern England. The tune name is after a Lancashire city on the northwest coast of England.

Roy Brunner (b. 1945), an American composer and organist who is currently organist of historic Park Street Church (Congregational) on the Boston Common. He recently retired as Professor of Music at Gordon College, Wenham, Massachusetts.

The words and music of **Will You Let Me Be Your Servant** were written and composed by Richard Gillard (b. 1953) and first published in *New Harvest* (Auckland, New Zealand, 1979). The author has indicated that the primary inspiration for this text was the account of Jesus' washing of the disciples feet, John 13:2b-17. Gilliard was born in England, but he emigrated to New Zealand with his family when he was three years old. He writes, "I've had almost no formal musical training. I'm a self-taught guitarist and play mostly in a folk style."

The **Joyful Response**, first published and recorded in 1983, this praise song was written and composed by the husband and wife team of Michael W. Smith (b. 1957) and Deborah D. Smith (b. 1958).

The text of **Make Me a Channel of Your Peace** is an adaptation of the famous prayer by Sebastian Temple (1928-1997). Although the prayer is often attributed to Francis of Assisi, there is no evidence of a connection to him other than the tone of the prayer agrees with his life and witness. The music was also composed by Temple and first published with the text in *Happy the Man: 13 Songs of Peace and Brotherhood* (Cincinnati, 1967).

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
