### From the Pastor

everything [in] between: a Lenten series in Luke's gospel meeting God in the midst of extremes



Beginning with Jesus setting his face

toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), we will make our way through several familiar stories—the Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. So many of these scriptures hold significance in pop culture, church history, politics, and everything in between.

As the folks behind Sanctified Art studied these familiar stories from Luke, they were struck by how Jesus' ministry was rooted in relationships that disrupted his time's established social, political, and religious divides. Perhaps because some of these stories are so well-known, and because of our distance from the day's culture, we might miss out on just how radical Jesus' words were and how extreme his teaching tactics might have felt. Jesus intentionally emphasizes God's radical, inclusive, and surprising love in these stories. When we explore these stories' historical and cultural contexts, we can see how they have much to teach us about the cultural and political divides many of us experience in our families, churches, and communities today.

The collaborators behind Sanctified Art have developed thematic material we'll use again this year. This is what they say about the theme:

"This series is an invitation to navigate the polarities in our lives with more faith, intention, and openness to be transformed. Each weekly sub-theme explores two supposed binaries, like "faith & works" or "rest & growth," or "grief & hope." We often consider these ideas to be opposing. However, as we explore these concepts within the scriptures, we find nuance and complexity. We find that these dichotomies are false. We might begin to see a full spectrum instead of black and white. We might find that God is present in between."

We will have personal devotional booklets and daily devotional cards available in the narthex and outside the church office beginning March 2<sup>nd</sup>. We'll also post daily on the church's social media accounts:

We hope you will join us this Lenten season as we look beyond binaries and easy answers, imagining where God might meet us beyond the categories we create. If you are trying to find your way through an undefined space, feel yourself living in a divided world, or seek a spiritual life that engages the complexity of life instead of avoiding it, we hope this season will help you on your journey and seeking. This Lent, let us trust that God shows up in shades of gray, rainbow hues, and everywhere in between.

### OLDER ADULTHOOD SMALL GROUP DISCUSSION/SUPPORT

The Older Adult and Caregiver Ministries will be starting a new discussion and support group meeting on the third Thursday of each month starting March 20, 2025. We will meet in the church library in the office building starting at 10:30 am. We'll begin with a devotion followed by conversations around facing and dealing with the challenges of an aging body, brain and lifestyle. On occasion we'll bring in an outside speaker to address topics of interest to the group i.e. housing options, normal aging and the brain, feelings of loneliness, making your home livable and much more. No registration is needed... just come when you feel the need.

### MARCH ADULT DAY TRIP

On Friday March 14th we'll be heading to Roswell for the BULLOCH HALL QUILT SHOW. The Bulloch Hall Quilt Guild is returning for their 39th Great American Cover-Up Quilt Show. After the Quilt Show we'll be heading out to lunch at the Mill Kitchen and Bar. Their menu includes small plates as well as soup, salads, and sandwiches.

SPRING ADULT RETREAT- for all adults, not just older adults!

The Spring Adult Retreat is on! We'll be going to Camp Mikell in the foothills of the Great Smoky Mountains, Toccoa, GA. Camp Mikell is a Camp and Conference Center of the Episcopal Diocese of Atlanta, Georgia. Their beautiful and expansive 460 acres have a little bit of everything: mountains, valleys, waterfalls, and the Little Toccoa Creek. The retreat starts Tuesday Evening, April 22nd at dinner with a late afternoon arrival and ends after morning worship on Friday the 25th. Camp Mikell is a 1 hr. and 35-minute drive from Tucker. We can provide transportation for those wanting to carpool.

They have 5 cottages located near the dining hall, a chapel and plenty of "hang-out" places. Each cottage can sleep between 4 and 10 people. There is room enough for folks to have their own room or to share a room with someone. Most rooms have their own bathrooms and full-sized beds and/or twin beds. Several of the cottages have screened-in porches that look over the valley and mountains. There are 3 handicapped accessible bathrooms. Cars can be parked right in front of each cottage and there are ramps everywhere.

The TOTAL price (including meals) if you share a double room is \$273.60 per person. Most of the double rooms have 2 double beds. The TOTAL price (including meals) for a single room is \$378.60. Most single rooms have a double bed and single bed or 2 single beds.

### NETWorks Cooperative Ministry's Love Your Neighbor as Yourself Month

On February 4th, NETWorks hosted a community breakfast to share updates about this critical local mission. In 2024, NETWorks volunteers distributed 463,000+ pounds of food, 386,000+ meals, and over \$122,000 in financial assistance to our neighbors. They are working on opening the grocery coop for more days and hours of service. They've also begun working with Atlanta Food Bank to coordinate mobile food pantries at local churches.

One of the exciting and innovative developments is a community-supported farming system. Growings! at NETWorks is an indoor Hydroponic Farming System (housed with the rest of their operations on Cowen Road) that:

- Grows high-quality garden-fresh produce tailored to NETWorks' shoppers
- Is semi-automated with pumps & timers
- Uses volunteers for starting seedlings, harvesting, packaging, & maintaining the system
